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When Is Hajj 2026? Dates, Key Days & Travel Tips

Because Hajj follows the lunar Hijri calendar, the exact start date depends on the official **moon sighting** announcement in the Kingdom.

Planning early matters more for Hajj than almost any other trip. Quotas fill, flights rise, and accommodation near the Haram and in the Hajj sites gets booked far in advance. So, **when is Hajj 2026** expected to happen on the Gregorian calendar?

Expected Hajj 2026 dates (Gregorian)

Based on current calendar projections, the **Hajj 2026 dates** are expected to be:

- **Hajj rituals begin: Monday, May 25, 2026** (8 Dhul Hijjah)
- **Day of Arafah: Tuesday, May 26, 2026** (9 Dhul Hijjah)
- **Eid al-Adha: Wednesday, May 27, 2026** (10 Dhul Hijjah)
- **Tashreeq days end: Saturday, May 30, 2026** (13 Dhul Hijjah)

Why dates can shift (moon sighting)

Hajj occurs every year in **Dhul Hijjah**, the 12th month of the Hijri calendar. Hajj 2026 is expected to take place in **Dhul Hijjah 1447 AH**. If you're tracking the **Islamic calendar Hajj 2026**, focus on the period **8-13 Dhul Hijjah**—those are the core days of Hajj rites.

Important Days of Hajj 2026

| 10 Dhul Hijjah | Eid al-Adha | Wed, May 27 | Stoning (Jamarat), sacrifice, shaving/cutting hair, Tawaf & Sa'i (depending on method) |
| 11 Dhul Hijjah | Tashreeq Day 1 | Thu, May 28 | Stoning of the Jamarat and continued rites |
| 12 Dhul Hijjah | Tashreeq Day 2 | Fri, May 29 | Stoning; some pilgrims depart Mina after this day |
| 13 Dhul Hijjah | Tashreeq Day 3 | Sat, May 30 | Final stoning for those who stay; completion of Hajj program |

*Dates are **expected** and can change with official moon sighting in Saudi Arabia.

If you're building your schedule, the day that most affects your planning is **9 Dhul Hijjah (Arafah)**. That day drives the rest of the timeline.

How Long Does Hajj Last?

People often confuse “how long the rituals last” with “how long the trip takes.”

Ritual days (core rites)

The core Hajj rites run from **8 to 12 Dhul Hijjah** for many pilgrims, and **up to 13 Dhul Hijjah** for those who stay the final day in Mina. That's **5-6 days** of main rituals.

Travel duration

In practice, most pilgrims are in Saudi Arabia longer because of:

- Arrival buffers (rest, briefing, Ihram preparation)
- Transfers between Makkah, Mina, Arafah, Muzdalifah
- Recovery time after the peak days
- Optional Madinah visit before or after Hajj

A typical Hajj package often ranges around **10 to 21 days**, depending on the country, operator, and whether Madinah is included.

My advice: if it's your first Hajj, avoid the shortest possible itinerary unless you're experienced with crowds and physical strain. A slightly longer schedule gives you breathing room.

When to book Hajj packages 2026

2. **Overpacking** (you'll carry more than you think)
3. **Not training physically** before the trip
4. **Ignoring heat and hydration** planning
5. **Not learning the sequence of rites** before arrival

You don't need to become a scholar, but you should understand the basic flow so you're not learning everything while exhausted in Mina.

Hajj Visa & Eligibility for 2026

For most pilgrims, the visa is arranged through official channels tied to approved operators and government processes.

While details vary by country, the typical process involves:

- Applying through approved systems or authorized agents
- Submitting passport details and personal information
